Promoting policies that ensure free and compulsory education for all children, along with accessible vocational training opportunities for adults, to support lifelong learning and skill development.

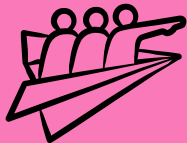

The number of digital devices distributed, the expansion of access to online learning platforms, and improved internet connectivity in underserved areas, enabling more students to engage in quality education.

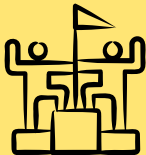

HIGHER LIFETIME EARNINGS
